Recently the number of Bulgarian speakers worldwide grew as a result of continuous migration. This process of relocation has several reasons, but mainly economic ones. One of the oldest Bulgarian communities outside of Bulgaria is in Austria, where Bulgarians first settled in the late 14th and early 15th centuries. The number of Bulgarian communities in the Austrian capital Vienna has grown very rapidly in recent decades. In the 1990s the Bulgarians in Austria were around 6,000; in 2005 the number increased to more than 30,000. At the moment **Bulgarians** are This book is a study about the speech of the Bulgarian community in Austria, which is basically bilingual. This speech is influenced by many linguistic elements: it is basically of a conversational character and is determined by the trends in the Bulgarian and German colloquial languages. On the other hand, it is influenced by the two standard languages. The Austrian media and the Bulgarian institutions in Vienna that support the Bulgarian standard language, such as the school, the press, etc., have an impact on this. Specifically in Vienna, the Bulgarians use the colloquial language of the Bulgarian standard language (the so-called mesolect). Both the old and the new immigrants have a relatively good professional qualification: they are e.g. Business people, diplomas, artists, students, scientists, doctoral students, researchers,

The mixed language in Vienna is characterized by outstanding peculiarities, especially in the lexicon. This is because the lexicology is the area that allows the foreign language influence to pass through. Although the phonetic and grammatical peculiarities are numerous, they come in second place - they are primarily of a literary character. The German transitive in the speech of the Bulgarians of Vienna are of two types: transitive interferent (in principle) and transitive transcoding. The first ones are mainly lexical and only partially change the Bulgarian code; the second are mainly lexical-syntactic in nature and change the code completely - it begins in Bulgarian and ends after the "switch" in German. This switching of the language code often takes place according to certain words, which are called "signal words" in this work. In the colloquial language of the Viennese Bulgarians there are two types of "signal words". One group are German forms with Bulgarian similarities, which,

depending on the level of language competence (the level of command of the German language), serve as a sign of interference and switching of the language code. The second group refers to German words that describe Viennese reality. Such words either do not have a Bulgarian correspondent, or this would not be appropriate. Although such a correspondent sometimes exists, the German word is much more decent. With their German form and content, these words "pull" the further German completion of the statement behind. With greater intensity these structures are in a polilogue, i.e. in a communicative situation where there are more than two participants - one of them Austrian, who knows or understands Bulgarian. The results of the different species combinations are mixed, Bulgarian-German, lexical and syntactic

From the combination of different elements of the Bulgarian mother tongue and the German Transitive there is a colorful mix of languages that can justifiably be called a mixed language.

Complicated is the situation of the Bulgarian language in new places. It is spoken in different ways depending on a range of factors:

- 1. Whether the migration population is more numerous and compact, i.e. whether it is recognized as a national minority or is a group which has not been recognized as a national minority in a foreign country with its own language.
- 2. The use of the Bulgarian language across the world, especially in places lacking a compact and numerically strong minority has an emphatically **generational** character. While usage is regular with the first generation of emigrants in a new country, it becomes limited with the second generation, i.e. the children of the same parents, to finally go down as a mere family memory with the third generation. This study aims to find the general extent to which the Bulgarian immigrant language has been preserved in a particular recipient country.
- 3. The **number of emigrants and emigration waves** which nurture and maintain the use of the Bulgarian language is also important for its preservation. In the United States of America for example, this number is substantial. The earliest emigration wave at the beginning of the 20th century was of economic nature, the second one in the 1930s (after 1923) of political (communist) nature; the third one after September 9, 1944 again of political but this time of anti-communist nature; the fourth after November 10, 1989 was again for predominantly economic reasons. The resulting ethnic continuity has catered for the perpetuation of the Bulgarian language in that country for a long time. A similar picture of the Bulgarian immigrant communities is seen in a few European countries.
- 4. The preservation of the Bulgarian language abroad benefits significantly from **supporting institutions** created in countries with Bulgarian immigrant communities. These institutions include public organisations, associations and societies, Bulgarian special interest clubs, Bulgarian schools, church communities, cultural centres, various news media (newspapers, radio stations, television channels) etc. Their precise number is not known with a view to their dynamic development leading to changes, i.e. data about supporting institutions has approximate nature and is far from absolute.

- 5. Given the **diverse forms** of the Bulgarian language **literary, colloquial, dialect, regional** and **literary-regional ones** it is important to establish in general which is the prevalent form of both the spoken language and the written register, if there is any.
- 6. Because this work is **linguistic**, its main term is the term of **Bulgarian-speaking** emigrants/immigrants. It denotes all ethnic Bulgarians (by origin) who continue using the various forms of the Bulgarian language regardless of their religious denomination or new nationality.

The German lexical, formative, morphological and syntactic influence on Bulgarian students' texts from Bulgarian-Austrian school "St. St. Cyril and Methodius "in Vienna is undoubtedly. Despite the enormous efforts of the teachers to keep the Bulgarian language and the positive results of their activities in this regard, the Austrian integrally trail continues to have an active influence on the so-called intermediate (mixed) Bulgarian-German named in previous research as gemischte bulgarisch-deutsche Sprache.

Important conclusions have been made that in order to have a lasting stabilization of the Bulgarian language, special attention should be paid to the supporting institutions - schools, libraries, church communities, publishing houses with publications in standard Bulgarian, ie. to prevent the severance of ties with cultural and educational institutions in Bulgaria. The need for serious work is emphasized in order for the Bulgarian language to take a worthy place in the bilingual and polylingual relations in international communication and not to be subordinate and to feel unprestigious.

The influence of the German language is expressed only in the extensive use of the base structures having one addition, but are found in

Bulgarian language (literary, colloquial and dialectical) and therefore does not feel foreign. It is available also in a slight majority of German syntax calque.

Intensive semantic translation (tracing) is underway, which even covers the use of prepositions. This is evidence of the truly mixed nature of ethnocodes, in which no transformational rules can be derived for ordering, hierarchizing and registering (stylistic) distinction of duplicate and varying tokens. The morphology of the German borrowed words according to the Bulgarian grammatical models is also a proof that they have firmly entered the system of the mixed language.

A characteristic feature of the oral-colloquial form of mixed language is that in phonetic and grammatical terms it is more stable, and in lexical terms it has a variable character. In the "crossing" of Bulgarian and German features in the mixed language in the field of phonetics and grammar the Bulgarian features prevail, and in the vocabulary - the German peculiarities. German lexical interferences, and especially those that have an international character and have Bulgarian counterparts, lead to variability at all language levels. Depending on the new status they receive, the German lexical units in the Bulgarian-speaking environment, in which they have their variants, can be considered as follows: 1. Phonolexical interferences; 2. Morpholexical interferences; 3. Derivative-lexical interferences; 4. Accent lexical interferences; 5. Lexicosemantic interferences. All of them testify to the presence of a colorful linguistic mixture, which proves the real existence of the mixed language of the Viennese Bulgarians.

The German lexical interferences are characteristic for the mixed language of the Bulgarians in Vienna. The first subgroup is represented by German interferences in Bul-garian immigrant speech with a different use than in the Bulgarian literary language. The second subgroup, on the contrary, is related to the inability of the interference to change (to wide or narrow) there meaning. The third subgroup are the individual seman-tic neologisms, and the fourth subgroup consists of interference calques.

The literary Bulgarian language, mostly in its colloquial form, is the unifying unit of the Austrian (and respectively of the Viennese) Bulgarians. The rare deviations in it, in the sense of dialectal manifestations in individuals, have an individual and not a mass character. If it is necessary to summarize these rare cases, then they could be reduced at most to some features of the Eastern Bulgarian or Western Bulgarian interdialect, ie. to features that are found in wider

geographical areas, and some of them almost on the entire Bulgarian language territory. These rare (inter) dialect elements coexist with the German interferences in the same way as the literary-Bulgarian forms. From the given numerous examples it is clear that today the East Bulgarian peculiarities (as dialects), connected with the softening of the consonants, with the reduction, with the dropping of sounds (vowels and consonants), with the similarities and dissociations (of consonants) make a stronger impression. From the West Bulgarian examples it is evident that changes are made in front of us with the consonant l, which is vocalized. The oxytonic accent has a more dialectal and interdialectal character, especially in the prefixed verbs in the past tenses.

The code switching happens often after certain words, which I call "signalwords". In the colloquial speech of the Viennese Bulgarians, the German word markers are found in two types of utterances: one are German words, for which there are no Bulgarian correspondence, but depending on the degree of the linguistic competence they serve as a sign of interference and switching the code. The second group refers to German words reflecting Vienna's reality, for which there is no Bulgarian correspondent or even if there is, the German more adequately reflects the Austrian reality.

The topic of Austrian language studies is quite new in Bulgarian and German linguistics. It is connected with the last emigrant wave of Bulgarians in the German-speaking area (especially in Austria) following the changes that took place in the 1990s when the Bulgarian community grew rapidly. Studies on the language of Bulgarian emigrants in Austria lay the foundations for shaping a new area in confrontational (Bulgarian-German) linguistics. It offers vast possibilities for further work. Of particular interest is the "mixed language" of Bulgarian emigrants. Our first-generation compatriots are subject to research, although comparative language information is also available for both the second and the third generation. In Austria, a new type of European community (with electronic signature) is being created. Thanks to the Internet, it crosses the borders and connects compatriots who have been separated from the territories between them. As the study shows, the mixed Bulgarian (Austrian) German language in Austria is a clear fact that has its specific problems and areas of study. The lexical features prevail, but in its grammatical system, which is the pillar of the language, it remains Bulgarian. The methodological provisions applied to the systematization and analysis of the material can also be used in the study of other mixed languages emerging in the contemporary interconnected world.

The article reviews several typical types of Bulgarian schools, mainly in Europe and to some extent outside it, from which it becomes clear that the main task of all of them is to preserve the Bulgarian language, which is the most important feature of national identity and to give some knowledge through him about Bulgarian history, geography, ethnology, ie. mostly for the Bulgarian humanities. In the spirit of Weinreich's theory of bilingualism, a distinction is made here between partial "code switching", i.e. the interference of the individual word and the more complete switching of the code (recoding), in which there is a transit of larger segments of the foreign language code - of combinations (syntagms) of words, expressions and even whole texts. The types of recodings are: a) Switchcoding with syntagms (free and phraseologized German combinations); b) Switchcoding with whole utterances (transcoding utterances). Usually, due to various reasons and circumstances, whole German utterances are inserted in the Bulgarian

code, with which the recoding is naturally performed; c) Transcoding with text (transcoding text). The accumulation of several transcodial expressions, which are in direct contact with each other within one or several speech acts, creates a whole text, which due to the way of its origin (by recoding) can be called a transcoding text, ie. text obtained after switching the code.

The Bulgarian dialect language today, due to changes of extra-linguistic nature, is identified within and outside the state borders of the Republic of Bulgaria in three historicalgeographic regions: Moesia, Thrace and Macedonia. Its singularity arises from its history: in the 9th century it was a classical Slavic language, while today it is an exotic Balkan language with a caseless **noun system**, demonstrating a widespread use of articles, analytical formation of degrees of comparison, object doubling etc.; and with a verb system characterized by replacement of the infinitive with the da-construction, analytical formation of the Future Tense with the use of particles etc. These grammatical features (with insignificant exceptions) are consistent across all dialects and are the basis of the specific character of the Bulgarian language as the only Slavic-Balkan language worldwide. This character has been verified by hundreds of foreign scholars. In phonetics and lexicology however, differences between dialects are more essential and the dialect division actually stems from them. The biggest uniform division of the Bulgarian language territory into two large parts - eastern and western – is made based on the successors of the Old-Bulgarian vowel Yat marked as σ and sounding like a very broad $e - \Gamma$ or '\(\bar{a}\). This pronunciation of the vowel which is not present in the standard language today is still common in dialects, mostly in the east. From the mouth of the River Vit to Thessaloniki there is a bundle of isoglosses termed the Yat isogloss belt.

Lexical features are reflected in a questionnaire examining the names of basic concepts of life and nature of the continent. Each card is accompanied by a detailed commentary, which clarifies the tokens in onomasiological, semasiological and motivational aspect, touching on characteristic issues of word-formation and phonetic variants. The results of the linguistic-geographical presentation help to clarify the interrelationships between the languages of the peoples of Europe. The results of the project have application in linguistics, culturology, history, European studies.

Ukraine, Slovakia, as well as Bulgaria, Macedonia, Serbia, Albania and others. Based on rich material from the German languages and dialects, the article reviews the species and genus concepts *Schäfer* and *Hirt*, and draws some parallels with Bulgarian. The figurative (symbolic) meaning - mythological or religious - is largely common to European peoples who have a similar mythology and Christian religion. The naked man comes into contact with them, acquires the ability to fight and defeat them. Clothing is a cultural achievement that protects. Nudity is an element of both pagan and Christian ritual. This determines a new main division —into Eastern (predominantly Slavic) and Western (Romance and Germanic) Europe.

There are the least contradictory views about the composition (repertoire) of characteristic features of the overall linguistic norm (regardless of whether these features are called by their ethnic name as Bulgarian or are attributed to some other or several other language systems). The Cyril and Methodius language norm, typical of almost all monuments of this era, has clear constitutive features, which are listed in the article. They are in the field of phonetics (phonetic norm); in the field of vocabulary (lexical norm). Both the archaic Proto-Slavic and the small proto-Bulgarian treasures are well preserved. At the same time, a new home vocabulary was created through word formation and semantic transmission. The main and largest share of foreign borrowings falls on Greeks and a much smaller share of Germanisms, Latinisms and Moravians.

From all the typical (characteristic of all monuments) archaic features of the Cyril and Methodius norm - phonetic, grammatical and lexical, we can confidently and impartially conclude that the norm is mainly covered even today in modern living southeastern Bulgarian speech mostly by the surroundings of Thessaloniki. This dialect is considered in two planes: a) in the narrow sense of the word, where today it is represented by the speech of the Thessaloniki villages Suho, Zarovo and Visoka, which preserved the nasalism of the vowels X and A, and b) in the broad sense of the word - as most southern Bulgarian dialect area, located from Thessaloniki to Constantinople (east), from Thessaloniki to Korcha (west) and south - from Smolyan to the White Sea (Oblak, Jagic, St. Mladenov). The most important modern features of this dialect area, which still correspond to the old Cyril and Methodius norm are listed in the article.

Consideration of the Thessaloniki dialect in the broadest sense of the word - as the southernmost Bulgarian area east of Constantinople and west of Thessaloniki to Korcha is evidence of the invaluable merit of Oblak, who with his fundamental discoveries guided Slavic linguistics on the right path to objective research. and rejected the statements of the Pannonian hypothesis.

The creative and educational activity of the two brothers from the Bulgarian-speaking Thessaloniki region Constantine-Cyril Philosopher and Methodius - creators of the Slavic script in the ninth century transcends the borders of Eastern Europe and acquires pan-Slavic, pan-European and world significance. The Holy Fathers of the Orthodox, and then of the Catholic Church as Byzantine missionaries, came into contact with representatives of both peoples from Western and Central Europe (Germans, Italians, Hungarians) and from Asia (Arabs, Turks), which also means with representatives of different religions.

Thus, several clearly defined pan-European structural models with a stable character are formed. This situation is largely present in the Bulgarian language.

The Bulgarian literary language has a record number of writing-regional codifications. While other Balkan languages are found in two states each (Greek - in the main state of Greece and in Cyprus; Turkish - in the main state of Turkey and in Cyprus; Albanian - in the main state of Albania and in Kosovo; Romanian - in the main state of Romania and in Moldova; the situation of Serbo-Croatian in the former Yugoslavia is not fully clarified), the Bulgarian language because of Bulgaria's failure to accomplish its national unification in the 20th century and due to forced emigration of the population after a few wars displays a record number of attempts at codification of regional written norms - six in total. Of these six codifications three were made on the basis of dialects and three - on the basis of the Bulgarian literary language (in the Aegean part of Greece, in the Republic of Macedonia and in Ukraine). In the latter cases, it is not actually a primary codification but a secondary one, a (re)codification of already established (dur-ing the National Revival era) and long-used Bulgarian literary language. All six of them however provide clear evidence of the pluricentrism of the Bulgarian language which is the result of the exceptionally complex historical destiny of the Bulgarian nation.

Due to the fragmentation of the Bulgarian national territory after the wars, the Bulgarian language, which remained outside the state borders, was found in the following places on the Balkan Peninsula: 1. In Romania - a) Northern Dobrudja, separated from Bulgaria during the Liberation 1877 - 1878 to Romania as compensation for Russia taking Bessarabia from Romania; (b) in the Banat region (now Romania), obtained from Hungary after the break-up of Austria-Hungary (1918). The Bulgarian population in Banat is a migrant, who came here mostly after the suppression of the Chiprovtsi uprising (1688) by the Chiprovtsi, Montana and Svishtov

regions. He is known as a Paulician, professes Catholicism and has a strong Bulgarian national identity. 2. In the former Yugoslavia - a) in Serbia - Pomoravieto (area along the Bulgarian Morava River, renamed South Morava), also handed over after the Liberation War (1877 -1878) to Serbia; b) in Vardar Macedonia, annexed by Serbia in 1913 after the Balkan War; c) in the western suburbs, taken from Serbia 1918-1919 after the First World War. 3. In Greece in the following Bulgarian lands - a) Aegean Macedonia, b) Western Thrace, annexed after the Balkan Wars and the First World War. 4. In Turkey in Eastern (Edirne) Thrace - initially with the local Bulgarians, and after their expulsion with the displaced Bulgarians - Muslims from the Rhodopes and Northern Bulgaria. The Bulgarian language was spoken by immigrants in Southern Moldova and Ukraine (they came there after the unsuccessful wars of the Russian Empire with the Ottoman Empire - 1777, 1812, 1856, and also after the September Uprising in Bulgaria in 1923). I. Only in Banat, and before the creation of the literary Bulgarian language, the so-called literary Bulgarian Banat language on a natural dialectal basis with the free will of the population itself (for more details see Stoykov 1967: 5 - 489). In the former Yugoslavia (in Macedonia) and in Northern Greece, several attempts were made to change the name of the Bulgarian nation and to recodify the established Bulgarian literary language in the Bulgarian language. The whole (re)codification activity reflects mostly the postulates of foreign national doctrines, which aim in most cases to change the national name of our language and people. Thus arose the linguistic phenomenon of pluricentrism in the literary Bulgarian language (with six written-regional norms, in addition to the main one).

All codifications, except for the Banat and the Ukraine one, have the same purpose - to replace or modify the name of the Bulgarian nationality and the Bulgarian language abroad. The Glottomy was a "natural" process, characteristic for Eastern Europe and a number of Central Asian Soviet republics. However, the recodificated Bulgarian "languages" are not formed on a dialectical basis, they are not based on a previously existing literature (with classical writers) but were announced by a decree on a certain date.

The Slavic studies after the Second World War was totally misled by Serbian and Soviet science, fulfilling the decisions of the Comintern in 1934 to create new nations and languages for the needs of the world proletarian revolution. Glototomy is a "natural" process typical of Eastern Europe and a number of Central Asian Soviet republics. It was noted that the fruit of Comintern linguistics were two other recodified Bulgarian "languages": the Aegean Macedonian "language" in northwestern Greece and the proletarian Bulgarian language in southern Ukraine (in the former USSR). Like the Macedonian literary "language" in Vardar Macedonia, they do not develop on a dialect basis, they do not have previous literature (with classic writers), but are declared unique - by decree on a certain date. The true picture of the glototomy in Bulgarian is revealed when reading "The Stenographic Notes from the First Language Commission", Facsimile, Skopje, 2000 by Dr. Stoyan Risteski. They are presented and analyzed in detail. The term intralinguistic translation in all its variants is introduced.

Andreychin and others from 1947, while the "Vardar" conceals this fact terminologically and the establishment of the plagiarism of Bl. Koneski is done after making deliberate comparisons.
